- **Be Ready Camp**

Would you like to develop leadership skills in your children or students? Give them an opportunity to learn about disaster preparedness, participate in a full scale mock disaster exercise and meet new friends in the process? If so, register for Be Ready Camp. Located at the Space Rocket Center in Huntsville, Alabama, Be Ready Camp is an innovative and unique five day full immersion residential camp that promotes citizen preparedness and participation to sixth graders in the State of Alabama.

Participants are selected through a competitive process and must be an Alabama resident who will be in the sixth grade in September 2009. The application process is open to all learners with applicants choosing to submit an essay, video or poster. Be Ready Camp is free to participants who are selected. It is the responsibility of the participant's parent and/or

- **Receiving a Denial Letter from FEMA**

Some Alabama residents who have applied for disaster assistance may have received a letter saying their application is denied. Don't be alarmed. Some denial letters are sent to applicants who simply need to supply additional information, so the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) can continue to process their applications.

Guidelines for appeals can be found in the Applicant's Handbook that each applicant receives. Applicants can also receive guidance on this issue at any Disaster Recovery Center or by calling the FEMA Helpline at 800-621-FEMA (3362) or TTY 800-462-7585. Lines are open daily from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m.

- **Identifying the Right Grantmaker**

Identifying the right grantmaker for any program or project is a straightforward, step-by-step process that can greatly increase the possibility of securing grant funding. Using GrantStation as a research tool, Cynthia Adams will walk you through an efficient and effective grant research process from start to finish. Grants and Funding Opportunities

Community Development and Housing

- **Racial Equality Programs Funded**
The W.K. Kellogg Foundation has announced a new grant opportunity in response to the Foundation's commitment to becoming an effective, anti-racist organization that promotes racial equity. Racial equity work

describes actions designed to address historic burdens as well as to remove present day barriers to equal opportunities by identifying and eliminating systemic discriminatory policies and practices. The Foundation's Community-Based Racial Healing Request for Proposals will provide grants of up to \$400,000 to strengthen community-based approaches for racial healing and racial equity efforts targeting vulnerable and marginalized children in the United States. The targeted groups include vulnerable African American, Native American, Latino/Hispanic American, Asian American, Pacific Islander, Native Hawaiian, Arab American, and European American children and families. Green Grants of \$2,500 and \$5,000 encourage projects that inspire kids to take care of the environment, be active and live healthier, and engage in community service. Applicants must participate in Worldwide Day of Play (September 26, 2009) or host a Big Green Help environmental project. Public and private elementary and middle schools as well as nonprofit community-based after-school organizations are eligible to apply. Applications from urban and rural/suburban areas as well as small and large community-based organizations serving all ethnicities are encouraged to apply.

- **Grants Encourage the Empowerment of Disadvantaged Groups**
The Presbyterian Committee on the Self-Development of People (SDOP) focuses its efforts on the empowerment of economically poor and disadvantaged people seeking to change the structures that perpetuate their condition. SDOP currently supports groups in the United States who are oppressed by poverty and social systems and want to take charge of their own lives. Funded projects must be presented, owned, and controlled by the groups of people who will directly benefit from them and must address long-term corrections of the conditions that keep people bound by poverty and oppression.
